Dear Father & Mother,

Hope you are receiving mail more regularly now, I cabled back on the same day that I received your cable, you should also have received the "stamps" which I registered and sent by air mail over a Month ago. None of the fellows have been receiving much mail from England lately, since last writing I have had one air-letter dated 31-12-43 and one airograph 30-1-44. Two "Chronicles", the "Times" continues to arrive fairly regularly.

We have now completed all our exams here, and the results came out of the "Big White Chiefs" office this morning, it was rather a pleasant surprise when I found out that I had the highest average in the Flight, I was quite satisfied with myself, but I certainly did not expect to be first out of 60 fellows.

I have now qualified for a pilots licence, and have completed the air-bombers and air-gunner courses, I expect to leave here at the end of this week and go to an A.O.S. to complete the navigator course after which we actually

graduate, we shall I hope be real "gen" men  
by then.

I will now write a rather belated account  
of my travels during the Christmas leave;  
I suppose its only natural for ones thought  
to turn towards home at Christmas time,  
and I'm no exception to the rule, but in  
spite of this I really did have quite an  
enjoyable Christmas, it was vastly different  
from the quiet time one usually spends  
at home, it was probably the change though  
that made it so pleasant.

As you know I went to Chicago with  
Harry Lloyd one of my chums on the same  
course here, we left Bellville station at 14.35  
on Thur. Dec. 23<sup>rd</sup> arrived in Toronto at 17.30  
and caught the 20.00 hrs to Chicago, we had  
intended to catch a train at 18.00 hrs but  
it was so crowded with people going away  
for Christmas that we couldn't get on.  
We arrived in Chicago at 09.00 hrs on Friday,  
it really is a marvellous city, the people  
there as I believe I told you in an airgraph  
are I found most hospitable, excuse me for  
repeating this, but in all fairness to the  
citizens of Chicago I feel that I must say  
once more that I think they cater for and  
treat their servicemen and any other allied

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servicemen that visit the city far better than  
any British or Canadian city that I have  
yet visited, no prairies of mine is high  
enough to do justice  to their efforts.  
This seems to be generally applicable to America  
though, of course I admit they have the  
money which makes a lot of difference, one  
of the banks that I went into occupies  
seven stories of a skyscraper and has a  
staff of over 3,000 and it is not the  
largest bank in Chicago, this gives you  
some idea of the wealth that goes through the  
city.

We stayed at the V.M.C.A. Hotel a huge building  
with over 2,000 rooms.

The skyscrapers along Michigan Avenue are  
an amazing sight.

We went to the top of the "Board of Trade"  
building (44 stories) in an elevator that travels  
at 900 ft./min; I found Harry's criticisms of  
various buildings in Chicago most interesting  
especially as he was talking with some  
knowledge of the subject, he was by the way  
studying architecture at Liverpool University before  
joining the R.A.F.

On Christmas Eve we went to the "Selwyn  
Theatre" to see "Clara Landi" in the play  
"Tomorrow The World" a very interesting

Melodrama about a 12 year old German boy  
who had been educated by the Nazis and  
taken to America after his Father had been  
killed by the Germans in a concentration  
camp for working against the Nazi party,  
the boy is a faithful supporter of Hitler  
and the play is about an American families  
problems in attempting to re-educate him.  
We afterwards went out to a party in the  
Varsity lounge with Pat. & Tex. two girls  
from Chicago University, the Americans of  
course are big believers in co-education,  
but after seeing the life of some of the  
students and some of the distractions of  
Chicago its a marvel to me how they get  
any work done at all, I cannot imagine  
a bigger contrast between there and Cambridge  
for instance; I thoroughly enjoyed the party  
though for they certainly know how to eat,  
drink and be merry.

On Christmas day evening we went to the  
"Great Northern Theatre" to see a farce  
"Unexpected Honeymoon" which was very  
funny indeed.

At night we went to another party in the  
Varsity lounge which broke up round about  
5 O'clock A.M. Boxing Day morning, it was  
almost 06.30 before we crawled into bed

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so needless to say it was midday before  
we arose on the Sunday morning,  
In the afternoon I went to a lecture  
at the "Planetarium"  Where they have a  
very intricate machine (made in Germany  
incidently) which projects into a large  
dome a complete representation of all the  
known planets and constellations in the heavens  
and by the operation of the machine which  
is electrical by the way, they are made  
to move relative to each other at any  
desired speed, so that overhead you can  
see how the heavens would appear on a  
clear night at ~~any~~ any place on the  
Earth at any time during any year.  
In the evening we went to the "Studebaker  
Theatre" to see "Noel Cowards" comedy "Blithe  
Spirit" which we both thoroughly enjoyed,  
after the show we went to one of the  
down town night clubs, but as we intended  
to be out of bed early on the Monday  
morning we left about 1-30 A.M. and were  
in bed by 2.30; we woke up about 8-O'clock  
and were out bright and early at 09.30 hrs  
well it seemed quite early at the time, all  
the big stores were open so we spent the  
morning looking round and shopping I posted  
some chocolates and ties which I hope you

will receive in due course

In the afternoon we went to the "Civic Opera House" to see the "Russian Ballet" a really wizard show.

At night we went to see a farce "3 is a Family" at the "Civic Theatre".

We left Chicago at 12 o'clock Monday night arrived in Detroit at 07.30 hrs. and after going through the customs etc, we left at 09.00 hrs and the train rolled over the bridge into Windsor Ontario, where you are again troubled by the Canadian customs.

We arrived in Toronto at 15.30 hrs. after a late lunch, we decided to catch a later train, as we wanted to see Claudette Colbert in "No Time for Love" The last train from Toronto was at 20.45 hrs we had just seen the programme through at 20.00 hrs but as the cinema was about 30 mins ride on the street car from the station, so we had a terrific rush to catch it, we made it though, no arrived back at Mountain View, feeling anything but refreshed, I must admit but quite happy and ready to tackle anything with a will, yes I certainly think the change did us a lot of good, I'm sure that in the long run our work benefited by it.

Since then I have only been off the station once, on the ground that is of course, and that was last week when we went into Bellville one evening to see a show, just for a change from the exams.

I don't think I told you but round about Christmas I received airgraphs from Uncle Billy, Mrs West, Mrs Strong, Loughborough and an air-letter from Mrs Chishman.

I haven't received the letter from Uncle Herbert that you mentioned though. Edith wrote telling me not to get footbitter as Cyril did, but I really haven't noticed the cold much so far, all the lakes round here are frozen over, its a very dry atmosphere though so that a temperature of  $-4^{\circ}\text{C}$ . here doesn't seem as cold as  $+4^{\circ}\text{C}$ . would in the damp atmosphere of England. Thanks for the razor blades, I hope they are more plentiful in England now though, as I'm not using that type of razor now. I bought a new "valet" razor shortly after arriving in Canada, but it doesn't occur to you to write about these things though.

The tooth brush was very welcome, as I was still using the brush that I brought from England, Those "Widom" tooth brushes really are good.

Oh! yes I also bought a <sup>8</sup> new watch just before Christmas, I had been having a lot of trouble with my old one, I don't think it was made for the rough wear they get in the air, or to stand the vibration of an aircraft, anyway it finally packed up, so I had to buy another one as they are essential in the air.

The new one I have is a 17 jewel lever and is supposed to be shockproof, waterproof, anti-magnetic and foolproof in spite of all this it has up to now kept very good time. I hope to get the other one repaired just to be on the safe side though.  
I really must retire now.
